INIMITABLE PERFORMER MARTHA GRAHAM CRACKER TO TAKE THE STAGE FOR NATIONAL MUSEUM OF AMERICAN JEWISH HISTORY'S OPEN FOR INTERPRETATION ARTISTS-IN-RESIDENCE PROGRAM

The National Museum of American Jewish History welcomes co-founder and co-Artistic Director of the OBIE Award-winning Pig Iron Theatre Company and alter-ego of the wildly-popular drag queen Martha Graham Cracker, Dito van Reigersberg, along with Music Director Andrew Nelson, for the second installment of its *OPEN For Interpretation* artists-inresidence program. OPEN invites creative thinkers to immerse themselves in the Museum's many stories of courage, imagination, struggle, and heritage as inspiration for new works of art, music, dance, writing, or performance that explore the American experience in new and unexpected ways.

For their culminating project, the artists are creating a 'Martha's eye-view' Museum audio experience launching in October, and an original cabaret entitled *It's High*

Time I Said Something: Martha Graham Cracker's Intervention at the Museum, which will be performed at the Museum in December. Van Reigersberg and Nelson drew their inspiration from the Museum's stories of American Jewish composers, lyricists, performers, and music-related artifacts; and from the lesser-known stories of interesting and inspirational women throughout American Jewish history featured in the Museum's core exhibition.

Martha's Audio Experience & OPEN Launch Party

The approximately 45-minute audio experience will take the visitor through highlights of the Museum's core exhibition with commentary from Martha Graham Cracker herself. She will provide insights into interesting details and facts that the casual observer might otherwise miss, fashion do's and dont's, and stories of the countless ways in which Jewish American history has made the world a better place for the gender warrior – people who break from traditional gender expectations. The audio will be accessible from visitors' personal smart phones and MP3 devices.

It's High Time I Said Something: Martha Graham Cracker's Intervention at the Museum will feature Martha accompanied by her six-piece band as she draws the audience into an intimate confessional, serenading them with Broadway classics and pop standards, created mostly by Jewish composers. Boldly and impossibly inserting herself into history, the personality hailed as the "Drag Queen King" by the Philadelphia Inquirer, will use her mash up savvy and sly way with radical musical reinvention to take audiences on a wild and bumpy musical ride through American Jewish history, offering a private glimpse into her reconnection with her own roots as she fans her inner Jewish flame into a blaze.
